RETURN TO IN-PERSON SERVICES

As it was announced that effective June 8, 2020, places of worship may resume services provided social distancing of two metres can be maintained between each individual household. The allowable occupancy is one-third of the defined occupancy rate of the facility to a maximum of 30 individuals for the initial stage of re-opening. TROPAR & KONDAK: Tone 2, Page 91 of the Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom Book.

TROPAR (Tone 2): When You went down to death, O Life Immortal, You struck Hades dead with the blazing light of Your divinity. When You raised the dead from the nether world, all the powers of heaven cried out: "O Giver of life, Christ our God, glory be to You!"

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, now and for ever and ever. Amen!

KONDAK (Tone 2): You rose from the tomb, O almighty Savior; and Hades, seeing this wonder, was stricken with fear; and the dead arose. Creation saw and rejoices with You, and Adam exults. And the world, my Savior, sings Your praises for ever.

PROKIMEN (Tone 2): The Lord is my strength and my song of praise, and He has become my salvation.

Verse: The Lord has indeed chastised me, but He has not delivered me to death.

EPISTLE: A reading from the Letter of the Holy Apostle Paul to the Ephesians (6:10-17)

Brothers and Sisters! Draw your strength from the Lord and his mighty power. Put on the armor of God so that you may be able to stand firm against the tactics of the devil. Our battle is not against human forces but against the principalities and powers, the rulers of this world of darkness, the evil spirits in regions above. You must put on the armor of God if you are to resist on the evil day; do all that your duty requires, and hold your ground. Stand fast, with the truth as the belt around your waist, justice as your breastplate, and zeal to propagate the gospel of peace as your footgear. In all circumstances hold faith up before you as your shield, it will help you extinguish the fiery darts of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the spirit, the word of God.

GOSPEL: (Luke 13:10-17)

At that time, on a sabbath day, Jesus was teaching in one of the synagogues. There was a woman there who for eighteen years had been possessed by a spirit which drained her strength. She was badly stooped, quite incapable of standing erect. When Jesus saw her, he called her to him and said, "Woman, you are free of your infirmity." He laid his hand on her, and immediately she stood up straight and began thanking God. The chief of the synagogue, indignant that Jesus should have healed on the sabbath, said to the congregation, "There are six days for working. Come on those days to be cured, not on the sabbath." The Lord said in reply, "O you hypocrites! Which one of you does not let his ox or ass out of the stall on the sabbath to water it? Should not this daughter of Abraham here who has been in the bondage of Satan for eighteen years have been released from her

shackles on the sabbath?" At these words, his opponents were covered with confusion; meanwhile, everyone else rejoiced at the marvels Jesus was accomplishing.



EPARCHY OF SASKATOON EPARCHIAL SAFEGUARDING POLICY: COVENANT OF CARE, ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATION AND TECHNOLOGY & ABUSE AND MISCONDUCT POLICY

This **Eparchial Safeguarding Policy: Covenant of Care, Electronic Communication and Technology & Abuse and Misconduct Policy** is a code of conduct which is designed to create safe and respectful church communities and healthy ministerial relationships, and to protect people from abuse and the harm that

results.

In the Pastoral Letter of the Synod of Bishops of the UGCC on "Safeguarding from Various Incidents of Violence towards Children, Handicapped, and Vulnerable People" (Oct 14, 2019), Patriarch Sviatoslav Shevchuk writes: "With this synodal message, we affirm the desire of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church throughout the world to progress to the next stage of understanding, healing, and preventing all forms of violence against human dignity in the church environment and in the community at large, 'working not for the sake of appearances, to please men, but as Christ's servants, who fulfil the will of God from the heart.' (Eph. 6:6) [...] Let us make our parishes, monasteries, and seminaries places of shared responsibility and brotherhood, where bishops, priests, monastics, and lay people all grow together in faith, love, mercy, and service to one another. Let us follow the model of Jesus Christ, who 'did not come to be served but to serve and give his life for the redemption for many.' (Matthew 20:28) [...] Dear brothers and sisters! Remember that any form of violence directed against human dignity disrespects the image of God and His likeness that are present in every person (Genesis 1:27; Psalm 8). But worse in the eyes of God is the sin of His servants, who violate their oaths and scandalize the hearts of those who trusted them. These evil deeds require lasting and patient healing that is not possible without God's grace, effective love, and mercy. Safeguarding from violence against children, minors and vulnerable persons, is the responsibility of every member of the Church – bishop, priest, consecrated person, layman and laywoman [...] Let our church communities be places where everyone, especially the most vulnerable, can fully feel their human dignity and feel protected."

In an effort to build and maintain church communities where every person feels safe and knows their full human dignity, we affirm the need for the people of God at every level of the Church to make it their responsibility to build these communities.

Part I: The **Covenant of Care** is a code of conduct which is designed to create safe and respectful church communities and responsible, healthy ministerial relationships, and to protect people from abuse and the trauma that results. In implementing this **Covenant of Care** the Eparchy strives to provide proactive protection for: minors and vulnerable adults, and

those who minister, including clergy, employees and church volunteers.

Part II: The *Electronic Communication and Technology Policy* is a guide to the safer utilization of technology and the communication opportunities it affords to bring the message of the gospel. Technology does not replace the need for person to person interaction but assists us in our ability to communicate. It is not without challenges. It is hoped that this Policy will help to mitigate those challenges to make our online environment safer. In this regard the Policy and Code of Conduct contained therein, must be adhered to by all who utilize this form of communication in ministry in positions of trust as defined in the Eparchial Safeguarding Policy Implementation Procedure.

Part III: The *Abuse and Misconduct Policy* is designed to ensure that allegations of physical and sexual abuse and other misconduct are handled responsibly, transparently and with all due care and attention.

Together these three parts form the *Eparchial Safeguarding Policy*, the present version of which is dated October 1, 2020, provides authoritative directives for all who minister within and on behalf of the Eparchy. This current document revokes and supersedes any previous policies and procedures regarding these matters. Bill C-7, which proposes to expand euthanasia and assisted suicide to allow more people to qualify, is now being studied by the Senate. A number of Senators and Disability Inclusion Minister Carla Qualtroughare seriously considering amending the draft legislation to allow people with mental illnesses to be euthanized

(https://www.kamloopsthisweek.com/news/patients-not-doctors-should-initiate-

conversations-on-assisted-dying-qualtrough-1.24246117). Mental illness was specifically excluded in the draft legislation, but we fear the calls to remove this exclusion will be successful, unless Canadians speak up. The Senate has already heard many compelling arguments against expanding euthanasia and assisted suicide in Canada, including representatives from the disability community, the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada, the Christian Medical and Dental Association of Canada and the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada.

This is a critical time to reach out to the Senate to let them know that you oppose the proposed changes to the "Medical Assistance in Dying" legislation.

If you haven't emailed your MP yet, please write them right away at <u>canadiansforconscience.ca/federal_government</u>. Then write the Senate at canadiansforconscience.ca/writesenate.

Once you've emailed them, we ask you to call your MP's office to let them know of your concerns. You can find their phone number and contact information at https://www.ourcommons.ca/Members/en. This follow up phone call will increase the impact of your voice exponentially!

ICON OF THE LIFE OF SAINT NICHOLAS – DECEMBER 6TH





"What do you want for Christmas?" A man in a red suit and white beard asks this question of many children at the shopping malls before Christmas. The image of the jovial man in a red suit known as Santa Claus is, in reality, based upon the memory of our Holy Father among the Saints, Nicholas, the Archbishop and Wonder-worker of Myra in Lycia.

Saint Nicholas was the bishop of Myra, a city in the province of Lycia in Asia Minor. Even in his own lifetime he was known for his acts of charity for the poor, the widowed, and the orphaned. As time went on, so did the reputation of his wondrous deeds, hence meriting him the title "wonder worker."

His reputation became widespread largely though maritime commerce traders who revered Saint Nicholas as the patron saint of sailors. Consequently, the legends of the wonder-working Nicholas became renown throughout many parts of the traveled world. It was the Dutch, however, who first brought the reverence for Saint Nicholas to America. In their native tongue, Saint Nicholas was known as *Cinter Klaus*, which sounds like "Santa Claus."

Although many of the numerous stories of Saint Nicholas may sometime be closer to the realm of legend than actual history, the fact remains that he was a beloved man of God who was known for his charity and acts of love and kindness, especially toward children. May this same spirit of generosity and love exemplified by Saint Nicholas be alive in our hearts during this time of preparation for Christmas and every day of the year.
