TROPAR FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT (Tone 2): We pay homage to Your undefiled image, Good Lord, and beg pardon for our faults, Christ our God. By Your will You chose to mount the cross in Your flesh to free Your creatures from slavery to the enemy. For this we gratefully cry out to You: "By coming to save the world, our Saviour, You filled all things with joy."

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, now and for ever and ever. Amen!

KONDAK OF FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT (Tone 8): The uncircumscribed Word of the Father became circumscribed by being enfleshed from you, Godbearer. You brought back the stained image to its original state by infusing it with divine beauty. But recognizing our salvation we portray it by word and deed.

PROKIMEN (Tone 4): Blessed are you, and praiseworthy, O Lord, the God of our fathers, and glorious forever is your name.

Verse: For you are just in all you have done.

EPISTLE: A reading from the Epistle to the Hebrews (11:24-26 32-12:2)

Brothers and Sisters! By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be known as the son of Pharaoh's daughter; he wished to be ill-treated along with God's people rather than enjoy the fleeting rewards of sin. Moses considered the reproach borne by God's Anointed greater riches than the treasures of Egypt, for he was looking to the reward. What more shall I recount? I have no time to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets, who by faith conquered kingdoms, did what was just, obtained the promises; they broke the jaws of lions, put out raging fires,

escaped the devouring sword; though weak they were made powerful, became strong in battle, and turned back foreign invaders. Women received back their dead through resurrection. Others were tortured and would not receive deliverance, in order to obtain a better resurrection. Still others endured mockery, scourging, even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, sawed in two, put to death at sword's point; they went about garbed in the skins of sheep or goats, needy, afflicted, tormented. The world was not worthy of them. They wandered about in deserts and on mountains, they dwelt in caves and in holes of the earth. Yet despite the fact that all of these were approved because of their faith, they did not obtain what had been promised. God had made a better plan, a plan which included us. Without us, they were not to be made perfect. Therefore, since we for our part are surrounded by this cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every encumbrance of sin which clings to us and persevere in running the race which lies ahead. Let us keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, who inspires and perfects our faith.

ALLELUIA VERSE: Moses and Aaron are among His priests and Samuel among those who call upon His name.

They called upon the Lord, and he answered them.

GOSPEL: John 1: 43-51

At that time Jesus set out for Galilee, but first he came upon Philip. "Follow me," Jesus said to him. Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the same town as Andrew and Peter. Philip sought out Nathanael and told him, "We have found the one Moses spoke of in the law -- the prophets too -- Jesus, son of Joseph, from Nazareth." Nathanael's response to that was, "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" and Philip replied, "Come, see for yourself." When Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward him, he remarked: "This man is a true Israelite. There is no guile in him." "How do you know me?" Nathanael asked him. "Before Philip called you," Jesus answered, "I saw you under the fig tree." "Rabbi," said Nathanael, "you are the Son of God; you are the king of Israel." Jesus responded: "Do you believe just because I told you I saw you under the fig tree? You will see much greater things than that." He went on to tell them, "I solemnly assure you, you shall see the sky opened and the angels of God ascending and descending on the Son of Man."

The word "Sorokousty" literally means "forty mouths" (sorok = forty; ust = mouth). Originally, this was a prayer service offered by forty mouths or by forty priests especially in Lenten time.


Sorokousty or All Souls Saturdays services have been celebrated for the deceased by holding Liturgies, panakydas or parastas for them in five Saturdays (This year only four Saturdays are scheduled because The Feast of The Archangel Gabriel replaces the fourth All Souls Saturday, but for pastoral reason a Panakhyda may be sung on that day).





Pro-life Personal Prayer Intentions for the weeks of the Great Fast

March 6 – 1st Sunday of Lent Sunday of Orthodoxy— When we are confronted with the Culture of Death, Lord help us remember and pray, "The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?" We pray for moral courage to confront and fight injustice wherever we might encounter it. We begin by asking You to help us in our daily lives, to treat all

encounter it. We begin by asking You to help us in our daily lives, to treat all persons with the dignity of ones who bear your image. As we gaze upon your holy icons, we especially pray in repentance for the sins of using other human beings through our lust, sexual sins and pornography which distorts and wounds our ability to receive You and see You in others.





START AND END YOUR DAY DURING LENT

WITH THE PRAYER OF ST. EPHEM

O Lord and Master of my life, Keep from me the spirit of indifference and discouragement, Lust of power and idle chatter.
(Prostration)

Instead, grant to me Your servant, the spirit of wholeness of being, humble-mindedness, patience and love.
(Prostration)

O Lord and King, Grant me the grace to be aware of my sins, and not to judge my neighbour, For You are blessed, now and forever and ever. (Prostration)

THE MAIN RULE OF FASTING - "DO NOT EAT EACH OTHER..."

Lent - the Great Fast - begins forty days before Palm Sunday, on the Monday after Forgiveness Sunday (Cheese-Fare Sunday), and lasts until the Friday preceding Palm Sunday.

Holy Week is a special Fast in honor of our Lord's Passion, and lasts from the evening of Palm Sunday until Holy Saturday inclusive.

According to the decisions of the Episcopal Synods of Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church the minimum prescriptions for fasting are:

- 1. On the first day of the Great Lent and on Good Friday there is a strict fasting. It is necessary to refrain from using foods and dishes containing meat, milk, eggs.
- 2. In other weeks of Great Lent: on Mondays, Wednesday and Friday should be kept from foods and meals containing meat; as well on Holy Saturday.
- 3. Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday are allowed all types of food and dishes.

Prayer & Good Works: All faithful are urged to attend, besides the regular Sunday and Holiday services, the special services of the Great Lent. They are exhorted to perform Christian and penitential deeds of charity.

Following the Church's recommendations about fast, we do not only fast from food, in today's world, we also need to fast from television, internet, computer, games or anything else that prevents us from hearing God's voice of Gospels.

All that the Church recommends to observe regarding the fasting is solely for the welfare of the faithful. It must be understood that the requirements for fasting are recommended only to healthy Christians who do not have any dependence on work, road, training, pregnancy, and much more. Following all previous rules, the Church, considering the present-day life and circumstances, prescribes all the recommended requirements for fasting on the conscience, conditions and current circumstances of the life of Christians.

Appeal of His Beatitude Sviatoslav on outbreak of war

Thursday, 24 February 2022

Today we solemnly proclaim: "Our soul and body offer we for our freedom! With one heart we pray: "Lord, Great and Almighty, protect our beloved Ukraine!"

Beloved in God people of Ukraine!

Our country is in danger again!

The treacherous enemy, despite his own commitments and assurances, breaking the basic norms of international law, as an unjust aggressor, stepped on Ukrainian soil, bringing with him death and destruction.

Our Ukraine, which the world fairly called "lands of blood", which has been so many times sprinkled with the blood of martyrs and fighters for the freedom and independence of its people, calls us today to stand up for it to defend its dignity before God and humanity, its rights for existence and the right to choose one's future.

It is our natural right and sacred duty to defend our land and our people, our state and all that is dearest to us: family, language and culture, history and the spiritual world! Holy righteous people, martyrs and confessors of the Ukrainian land, pray and intercede for us before God! God's blessing be upon you!



ORTHODOXY AND ICONS



TODAY, March 6th, 2022 – First Sunday of the Great Fast is the Sunday of Orthodoxy which celebrates the restoration of the Orthodox use of icons in the Byzantine Empire. But what exactly is "Orthodoxy" and what does it have to do with icons?

Literally the word means "rightly proclaiming" – those who glorify God in the correct manner. The oldest use of this term in the Christian East is in reference to the understanding of the Trinity as expressed in the Nicene Creed. If you could not profess this creed, then you were not Orthodox. Thus, the sixth century Code of Justinian, the compilation of laws in the empire, decreed: "We

direct that all Catholic Churches, throughout the entire world, shall be placed under the control of the Orthodox bishops who have embraced the Nicene Creed."

Since then the Eastern Churches in the Roman Empire and their offshoots have called themselves Orthodox. There are two major groups of Orthodox Churches: those of the Byzantine tradition, called in English "Eastern Orthodox" and those of the Syriac and Coptic traditions, called "Oriental Orthodox." The Armenian Church, considered one of the Oriental Orthodox Churches, does not generally use the term as Armenia was not part of the Byzantine Empire.

It was only after the separation of the Greek and Latin Churches in the Middle Ages that the term "Catholic" became more identified with the Western Church and "Orthodox" with the Eastern Churches. To this day, of course, Orthodox use the term "Catholic" and vice versa. Most Greek Catholics continue to use the term "Orthodox" when it appears in their liturgical texts, as well.

As the controversy over icons developed in the Byzantine Empire, many saw the use of icons as a necessary consequence of the Incarnation of Christ as expressed in the Nicene Creed. If the Word of God truly took flesh, He could be depicted in images. As St. John of Damascus wrote, "In the old days, the incorporeal and infinite God was never depicted. Now, however, when God has been seen clothed in flesh and talking with mortals, I make an image of the God whom I see. I do not worship matter; I worship the God of matter, who became matter for my sake, and deigned to inhabit matter, who worked out my salvation through matter. I will not cease from honoring that matter which works my salvation."

Since the Church saw icons as connected with its faith in the Incarnation, it came to see icons as an expression of the Orthodox faith. Thus, the definitive restoration of icons in Constantinople on the first Sunday of the Great Fast in the year 842 was called "Triumph of Orthodoxy."
